A People After God’s Own Heart

“I have found in David the son of Jesse a man after my heart, who will do all my will” (**Acts 13:22b**). This beautiful compliment, “a man after My own heart” is one that should characterize every person who wears the name of Christ.

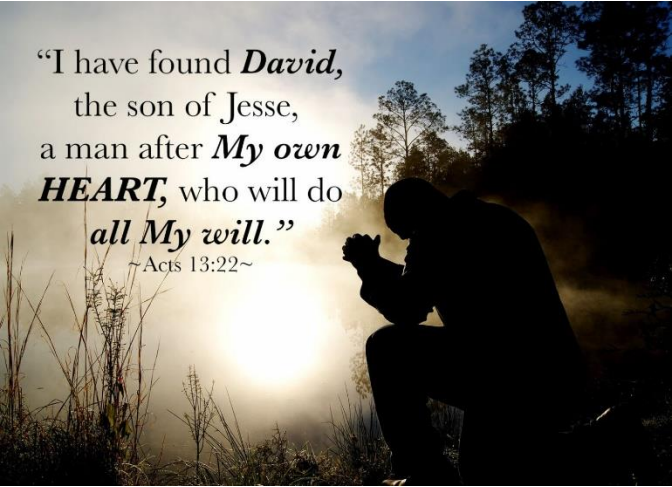
David loved the word of God, “Oh how I love your law!” (**Psalms 119:97**). This psalm, if not written by David, it certainly expresses his sentiment found elsewhere. We find one who has a great love for God’s word (**Psalms 119:47-48**) He loves God’s word because it protects him from sin, revives him in trials, and gives him peace of mind (**Psalms 119:11, 50, 165**). How do we respond to God’s word? Do we hide it in our heart? Do we find it to be a source of comfort in times of affliction? Does it give us peace of mind? If not, we should give heed to the instructions of David (**Psalms 1:1-3**). We should look to God’s word in all things.

David loved to pray, “I will call upon Him as long as I live” (**Psalms 116:1-2**). His love for prayer was based upon the fact God had answered him before (**Psalms 116:1-2**). It was based upon the fact that God had greatly blessed him (**Psalms 116:12-13**). It was based upon the fact that prayer brought God close to him (**Psalms 145:18**). How is our love for prayer? Have we found it to be a source of peace “which surpasses all understanding”? (**Philippians 4:6-7**). Do we “pray without ceasing”? (**1 Thessalonians 5:17**). If not, then let us learn to depend upon prayer for our preservation (**Psalms 32:6-7**).

David loved to praise God, “seven times a day I praise You” (**Psalms 119:164**). He praised God because of His righteous judgments, His greatness and His loving kindness (**Psalms 95:1-7**). David was determined to sing praises as long as he lived (**Psalms 104:33**). Do we love to praise God? Do we delight in singing praises to God in song? Do we take time to praise God in our prayers? David has words to encourage our praise of God. “Praise the Lord! For it is good to sing praises to our God; For it is pleasant and praise is becoming” (**Psalms 147:1**).

David hated every false way. “I hate every false way” (**Psalms 119:104**). His hatred was based upon his understanding of God’s word (**Psalms 119:104**). His hatred affected his selection of activities and friends (**Psalms 101:3-4, 6-7**). What is our attitude toward falsehood? Do we compromise? Do we recognize that we are involved in a “battle” over the souls of men, and are not to think lightly of that which is false? (**2 Corinthians 10:3-5**). David wasn’t perfect, but he softened his heart in repentance to God. We must not compromise on sin. These are a few

examples of a man after God’s own heart. We should strive to live in such a way that the same is said of us, a people after God’s own heart.



A few words...

David – a man after God’s own heart. As we consider the article by Brother Blackmer, we need to think about what that means for us. I remember a time when I was convinced that I could never be that “man after God’s own heart” like David was. After all, David was hand selected by God to lead His people. David, the youngest in the family, was chosen above all of his older brothers to be a king. How can I ever be like David?

Well, each of us has to understand that we too, were chosen by God. He speaks to us about this throughout His word. Paul says in Romans that all things work together for good to “those who are called according to His purpose” (**Romans 8:28**). In his letter to Timothy, he says “Nevertheless, the firm foundation of God stands, having this seal, “**The Lord knows those who are His,**” and, “Everyone who names the name of the Lord is to abstain from wickedness.” (**2 Timothy 2:19**). God has chosen all of us to be His people.

So, if we are chosen to be God’s people, then maybe we can also be a people after His own heart. When we think of David, it’s easy to think of the king who led the nation of God. The man that led armies to victory. The man from whose lineage would come the Messiah. However, we can also remember the man who committed adultery with Bathsheba and then conspired to have her husband killed. The man who numbered his people even when God told him not to do it. David was not a man without sin. So how did he become a man after God’s own heart?

When I think about David and I try to understand how he could be that man after God’s own heart, I look at what he did after these acts of sin.

David did not try to hide. He did not try to deny his sin or make excuses. He turned back to God and repented of his sin. David, even when he behaved badly, still desired to have that relationship with his God. David showed shame, sorrow, regret and even anger at times, but in the end he always turned back to his God with a desire to maintain his relationship.

Now, there is the lesson for us. If we want to be a people after God’s own heart, then we need to have that desire to maintain our relationship with Him. And, how do we do that, by seeking to do His will and when we stumble, acknowledging it, repenting of our mistakes, and returning to our walk with Him. Peter writes something important for us in his letter – “The Lord is not slow about His promise, as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing for any to perish but for all to come to repentance” (**2 Peter 3:9**). God is very patient towards us- His creation – and gives us time to mend our relationship with Him.

How’s your relationship with God? Have you moved to mend that brokenness with Him? God is always there, waiting for us to return – just like the father with the prodigal son. He never leaves us. It is us who leaves Him. Let’s be like David – a man after God’s own heart – and maintain our relationship with Him.
